Letter from our CEO



In 2025, Bloom experienced a series of meaningful “growth spurts” that strengthened our ability to meet the needs of every child who walks through our doors. Even as funding across the child welfare sector declined, the needs of foster children continued to rise. Thanks to the generosity, advocacy, and unwavering support of donors like you, we were not only able to meet that growing need, but we also served more children than ever before with dignity, comfort, and care when they needed it most.

Because of your support in 2025, Bloom:

- **Continued expansion of our Rome location**, extending the reach of The Bloom Closet and Foster Care program to children across Northwest Georgia.
- **Responded within 48 hours of placement through Bloom Direct**, ensuring that children entering care received personalized boxes of essential items delivered directly to them, providing comfort and dignity from day one.
- **Launched Bloom Beyond**, our program for teens and young adults aging out of foster care. This program served more than 100 teens and young adults in just under 10 months, providing mentorship, life-skills training, and navigator support to prepare them for independent futures.
- **Supported and equipped more foster families**, providing evidence-based training through Bloom University and ongoing support that enabled safe, stable placements, and allowed children to remain in the communities, schools, and support systems they know, with a placement stability rate of 93%.
- **Expanded support to vulnerable families** through Bloom's Family Resource Center, serving 434 children and 154 families across Fayette and Spalding counties with free essential resources, parenting support, and community connections to help keep children with their birth families.

In total, Bloom served 8,272 children in 2025, more than any other year in our history.

Every number tells a story, but the true impact is in the moments you cannot measure: the child who arrived with only the clothes they were wearing and left our Closet smiling; the teen who finally felt seen and supported; the foster parent who told us, “Bloom made this possible.”

These moments are the heart of our mission. They remind us that as the need continues to rise, our ability to respond must grow along with it.

As we move forward into 2026, we will continue to expand access, strengthen programming, and ensure that every child entering care feels valued, supported, and seen.

Thank you for helping Bloom grow and for nurturing hope, dignity, and possibility for Georgia's foster children. Together, we are not just meeting needs. We are nurturing potential and growing futures.

Why Bloom Exists

Bloom exists because every foster child deserves dignity, stability, and a safe place to land. With a vision to reach every foster child in Georgia, Bloom bridges critical gaps in care and essential resources. Our staff strategically collaborates with donors, foster families, volunteers, and community partners to make this vision a reality.

Who We Serve

Each year, Bloom serves thousands of children currently in Georgia's foster care system, as well as those at risk of entering care. Our programs provide:

- Foster children with stable placements and essential everyday needs.
- Foster families with training, resources, and support to nurture children who have experienced trauma.
- Birth families with skills and resources to provide safe and healthy care.
- Young adults aging out of foster care with guidance and resources for successful, independent living.

Bloom's Core Programs

Foster Care & Family Resource Center: carefully matching children with safe, loving foster families while also strengthening and supporting birth families through prevention-focused services, ensuring children and families receive the stability, care, and resources they need to thrive.

Bloom Closet: providing foster children and families with FREE clothing, supplies, and everyday essentials to help ease financial burdens and create a sense of normalcy, including Bloom Express and Bloom Direct programs.

Bloom University: evidence-based training provided to equip foster and birth families with the skills and knowledge needed to safely support and parent children who have experienced trauma.

Bloom Beyond: comprehensive guidance, support, and resources for young adults aging out of foster care to guide them along in the transition into independent living with confidence.

The **Foster Care** program maintains an A+ rating by the State Office of Provider Management for excellence in program delivery.

- Bloom's Foster Care program in Northwest Georgia is thriving and has maintained a **100% stability rating** for the foster children served in 2025.
- Bloom University provided training to over **3,266 foster families** across multiple regions in 2025.
- Bloom's Family Resource Center (FRC) elevated its leadership in prevention services, earning acceptance into the **National Exchange Club** as regional members and recognition as leaders in the state of Georgia.
- Bloom's FRC is now certified to provide **Home Visitation Services** using the Exchange Parent Aide model, deepening our commitment to child abuse prevention and community building.



Meeting Children Where They Are

FOSTER CARE SUPPORT

Bloom's Foster Care Program is rooted in the belief that children thrive when they are supported in familiar, stable environments. By providing trauma-informed care and local foster placements, we work to minimize disruption, preserve community connections, and surround children with consistent, compassionate support. From dedicated family consultants to collaborative partnerships with caregivers and schools, Bloom's foster care team meets each child where they are, helping them move forward with dignity, stability, and hope.



A New Beginning Close to Home

Eleven-year-old Noah and his two younger sisters found hope and stability six months ago when they were placed in the foster home of a loving caregiver in Rome. After enduring extreme neglect and emotional abuse, the siblings faced multiple placement disruptions that led to emotional instability and caused significant academic challenges, especially for Noah, who had to change schools multiple times during his critical 5th-grade year.

Bloom opened its second location to provide foster care services in Northwest Georgia, with a mission to keep children close to their communities and schools. By offering local placements, Bloom aims to minimize disruptions in children's lives, helping them maintain connections with familiar environments, friends, and educational support systems.

Since being placed with this foster parent and supported by Bloom's dedicated foster care team, Noah has slowly begun to heal. With patient care and consistent support, he regained his trust in others and rebuilt his confidence. The foster parent's nurturing environment, combined with the support of Bloom's family consultant, created a strong support network for Noah, including collaboration with his teachers to address his academic needs.

The results have been remarkable: Noah has been accepted into advanced classes in Language Arts, Math, Science, and Social Studies as he prepares to enter 6th grade this August. His story is a testament to the transformative power of compassionate foster care and the commitment of Bloom's foster care team to helping children thrive despite the challenges they face.

Care that Builds Confidence

BLOOM CLOSET SUPPORT

The Bloom Closet Program ensures children and youth experiencing foster care have access to clothing and essential items in a way that preserves dignity, builds confidence, and affirms individuality. Through a welcoming, boutique-style Bloom Closet, children are invited to select items that reflect their personal style and needs. When in-person visits are not possible, the Bloom Closet Express heads out to deliver the same boutique shopping experience on wheels, visiting group homes, DFCS agencies, and more. The third layer of support for those in far reaching areas is our Bloom Direct service where personally tailored boxes of all the necessary essentials are shipped to children in rural and underserved areas. Together, these three programs pave the way to work toward meeting every foster child throughout the state of Georgia exactly where they are and produce meaningful moments of care, comfort, and belonging.



STYLE, CONFIDENCE, AND FUN AT THE BLOOM CLOSET

For the girls at Foundations Group Home, a visit to the Bloom Closet is about far more than picking out “new” clothing; it’s an experience rooted in self-expression and connection. During special “girls’ days,” the Bloom Closet staff go above and beyond to create a memorable experience, thoughtfully preparing outfits and pulling extra shoes and fun accessories. This allows the girls to celebrate their individuality in a space designed to make them feel seen and valued. These visits also include mini fashion shows complete with laughter, cheering, and a carefully curated music playlist that turns the day into a lasting memory.

“The Bloom Closet gives our girls the chance to express themselves and feel confident in who they are,” shared a staff member at Foundations Group Home. “You can see their confidence grow right in front of you.”

Through the Bloom Closet, Bloom Express, and Bloom Direct, Bloom turns meeting a basic need into an opportunity for healing, creating moments where children feel confident, celebrated, and proud of who they are.

- Since opening in 2010, The Bloom Closet has experienced a **20-30%** annual growth rate in the number of children served, demonstrating the increasing demand for services.
- Last year alone, Bloom served **8,272** foster children from **142** Georgia counties, providing over **\$2.5 million** in free clothing and supplies.
- In 2025, the Bloom Closet in Northwest Georgia served over **1,097** children (nearly double from the previous year), with an estimated **24,468** items distributed, totaling **\$181,632**.

GROWTH *Spirits*

Provided **support and resources to over 250 transition-aged youth** through special projects and community events.

Enrolled **55 youth in Bloom Beyond's Navigator program** and provided financial assistance for education, medical bills, housing, food insecurity, and other urgent expenses.

Delivered **hundreds of college care packages statewide** in partnership with Embark Georgia, encouraging persistence and success among students with foster care experience.

Despite more than half of participants **experiencing homelessness or facing eviction, 95% achieved stable housing**, with **100% maintaining that stability** throughout their time in the program.

In under a year, **97% of participants were enrolled in secondary education** or actively pursuing a high school diploma or GED.

Supporting Independence

TRANSITION-AGED YOUTH SUPPORT


In 2025, Bloom Beyond became a critical lifeline for transition-aged youth (TAY) navigating adulthood after foster care. For young people aging out of foster care without the safety net of family or financial support, the path forward can feel overwhelming. Created to transform lives, Bloom Beyond meets young adults exactly where they are and provides the guidance needed to move through crisis and toward a self-sufficient future defined by stability and hope. This year, Bloom Beyond provided comprehensive, individualized support to over 250 young adults facing homelessness, educational barriers, and urgent financial need. Through housing stabilization, education and career support, and essential resources, the program helped ensure that youth were not defined by the circumstances they aged out of but empowered by the opportunities placed ahead of them.

Meredith's Story: From Uncertainty to Opportunity

When Meredith connected with Bloom Beyond, she was determined to move forward toward independence but lacked the resources to do so. Bloom Beyond supported Meredith in earning her GED, a critical milestone that opened doors to her future. From there, the program helped her enroll in college and secure an apartment, providing the stability she needed to focus on her education and long-term goals. Today, Meredith is continuing her academic journey with a foundation built on safety, support, and belief in her potential.

Raymond's Story: Stepping Into Stability

On the day Raymond turned 21, he aged out of foster care and immediately became homeless. Bloom Beyond stepped in that very day, securing emergency housing so Raymond would not be sleeping on the street. Since then, the program has supported him in starting his college career and moving into his first apartment. What could have been a devastating turning point instead became the beginning of stability, growth, and hope.

 The Bloom Beyond program has taken so much stress off my shoulders. It has been the biggest blessing I have ever received. Most college students have the support of their parents: I don't. I was working many jobs to pay my rent, insurance, and basic necessities, sometimes missing classes just to keep my bills maintained. Since Bloom Beyond came into my life, so much weight has been lifted. I was able to focus on school and obtain a scholarship to study abroad. Their support means everything - it means my future is secured.

Cathy Spitz

We are thrilled to recognize Cathy Spitz as one of Bloom’s incredible volunteers! In 2025 alone, Cathy dedicated over 680 hours of her time to serving children in foster care through Bloom, which is an extraordinary commitment. Cathy’s consistency, reliability, and heart for our mission do not go unnoticed. Whether she’s helping process donations, organizing inventory, or jumping in wherever help is needed, she brings a servant’s heart to everything she does. Because of Cathy’s dedication, countless children have received quality clothing and items during times of transition. We are so grateful for her generosity of time and spirit and are truly better because of her.



Group Volunteer Highlight:

Berry Bonners

The Bloom Closet in Northwest Georgia has been significantly strengthened by the dedication of the Bonner Scholars from Berry College. What began with one assigned scholar when the closet opened in 2024 has grown to 12 Bonner Scholars during the 2024–25 academic year, each committing extensive service hours to support daily operations. These students assist with sorting, organizing, and staging clothing; supporting appointments; and guiding foster children in selecting outfits that help them feel confident and cared for. Their consistent presence and passion for service have played a vital role in ensuring the Bloom Closet remains welcoming, efficient, and well-stocked for children in foster care across Northwest Georgia.

Community Partner Spotlight

Home Depot

Bloom is deeply grateful for the continued partnership of The Home Depot, whose teams consistently show up to support children in foster care with purpose and heart. In 2025, Home Depot volunteers from the finance, flooring, and sales teams contributed their time and energy to assemble bikes, fill over 1,500 backpacks, and create 600 toiletry kits. Additionally, a dedicated group from the Home Depot Pro Team participated in a hands-on morning of team building, assembling 200 art therapy kits for children and teens, each including a handwritten message of support. Their kindness, enthusiasm, and commitment help create confidence and joy for the vulnerable children and youth served daily through Bloom Closet operations, making a lasting impact across our programs.



Lizard Thicket

Lizard Thicket has long demonstrated that business success and community impact can go hand in hand. Under the leadership of Sheri Waynick, giving back has been woven into the company’s mission. Through both financial support and meaningful engagement, Lizard Thicket continues to invest in the well-being of children and families served by Bloom. One of the most meaningful expressions of this partnership is the annual L’Tee It Up Golf Tournament, which brings supporters together for a day of friendly competition and purposeful giving. Hosted this year at the Braelinn Golf Club, the tournament rallies golfers, sponsors, and community members to raise critical funds for Bloom’s work with children in foster care. We are deeply grateful to Sheri and the Lizard Thicket team for their generosity, leadership, and heart for children. Their generosity reflects a deep commitment to using their platform as a way to strengthen the communities where they live and work.

Westminster Schools

Bloom is proud of its growing partnership with Westminster Schools, a valued Atlanta community partner that played a meaningful role in our success in 2025. Westminster supported Bloom through a campus-wide collection of new and nearly-new clothing and essentials, participation in the school’s Partners in Purpose fundraising event, and a student-led clothing drive organized by members of the Service Council. The school also agreed to host a dedicated on-campus donation receptacle, which students actively maintain by regularly sorting and organizing clothing before delivering it to Bloom. Westminster students demonstrated impressive leadership and creativity by launching the drive through morning announcements and a student-produced video. This partnership reflects the power of community in action, providing critical resources for children in foster care while empowering students to lead with compassion, purpose, and impact.

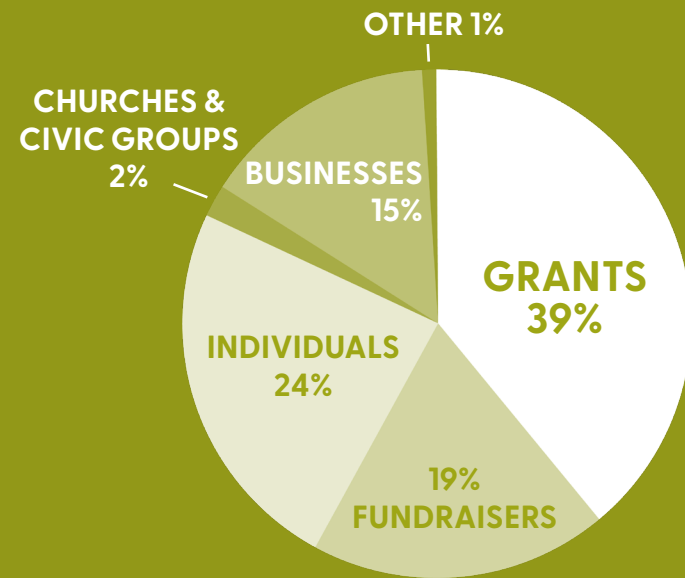

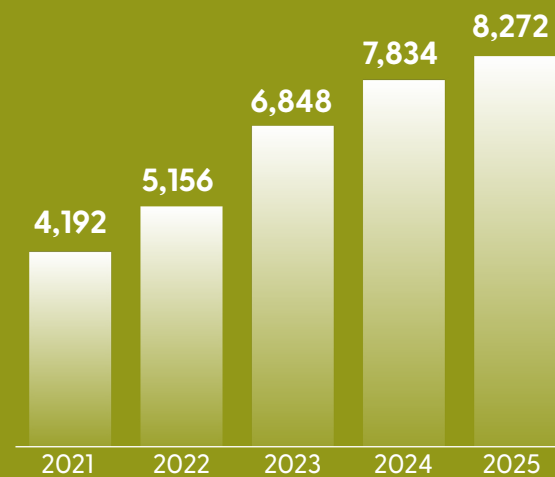


DONATION SOURCES (2025)
